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Message from Elaine

Many of you whom I've had the chance to meet know that I love quilts. I find quilting to be reflective and relaxing, and I also enjoy the history behind quilts, and collecting them. I think they're fascinating. A couple of weeks ago I attended a national quilt festival held here in Denver. Among the exhibits was a quilt competition with over 400 entries from all over the country. As I looked at every quilt, I read the synopsis of the quilt's "background" - **why** it was made. Often those stories were as interesting as the quilt itself. Most of them talked about what was going on in the life of the quilter as she...or he...decided to tell their story in fabric. One heartwarming piece showed 3 servicepersons holding onto each other walking out of a jungle...in Vietnam. It was made when her husband and two sons were serving. Another stunning work of art was made solely of 1" hexagons - 76,826 of them! The entire quilt was hand pieced and hand quilted. It took her over 3 years. Why such a painstaking journey? She had discovered that she was unable to have children and it was her way of battling her grief while she recovered emotionally.

Quilts are a statement of what is important to the quilter, a confirmation of something in their world, whether positive or negative, static or needing change. Every quilt is more than fabric - it is: a story waiting to be told, a map to freedom, a beautiful journal that keeps hearts from becoming too lonely or allows those same hearts to express sheer joy. They are the preservation of cultures and family histories. Quilts are the preservation of a quilter's voice.

I inherited a family quilt from the late 1800's. It's a crazy quilt design and on each piece of fabric is the embroidered signature of a family member or a citizen of McClure, Pennsylvania. This reinforced to me that these people are MY family history...my past. I tell you this because YOU are part of my future...my friendships and those I care about. I'm designing a quilt that uses circles woven together with a fabric photograph in each circle. Those photos are going to be of all the amazing men and women...you...who have shared your lives with me through the books and speaking engagements at Family Readiness Conferences. I have so many smiling faces that have been emailed to me and I will call the finished quilt..."**Circle of Friends.**" Thank you for sharing your lives with me and letting me call you friend.

News you can use...(or may already know)

Often I'm contacted by sources and asked to pass along information to you. Here are some of those postings.

1. Gift Certificates through AAFES

"Receiving confirmation that Americans back home are thinking of you while you're far from home is critical to good morale," AAFES Chief of Corporate Communication Army Lt. Col. Debra Pressley said. "Send a gift certificate to a soldier through aafes.org, or when you see a person in military uniform, shake their hand and say thank you for serving our country."

Gifts from the Homefront gift certificates may be redeemed at any AAFES exchange worldwide, including 52 BX/PX facilities throughout OEF/OIF. Troops use the certificates to purchase items ranging from personal-care items, sodas, candy and snacks, to DVDs, televisions or video games.

Those wishing to send a Gift from the Homefront can log on to aafes.org or call (877) 770-4438 to purchase gift certificates in \$5, \$10, \$20, \$25 or \$50 denominations. From there, the Gift from the Homefront may be distributed through a number of sources.

2. Finally...a great source to make Flat Daddies!

Most of you know about Flat Daddy either through the book or seeing him at the FRG conferences. I'm always asked about a good, less expensive source for having one made. Up to now I've been unable to provide an answer and it's been frustrating. Now I have a source! After I spoke for the Ft. Sesame Workshop, the makers of Sesame Street, will launch the program as a DVD kit. Performed in English and Spanish, it will not air on television but will be distributed free to schools, childcare programs and family support centers, thanks to a gift from Wal-Mart stores and other sponsors. The kit covers all phases of deployment - from pre-deployment to homecoming -- and the unique challenges each phase poses. *(To get a copy, check with your school or daycare center. I need your help!


Have you and your spouse ever attended one of the **PREP Marriage Enrichment Seminars** offered? If so, please read on:






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**Remedies In Your Home
